Linda Lehmann is 5'5" with blonde hair and blue eyes. She wears size "15" shoes and loves to eat apples.

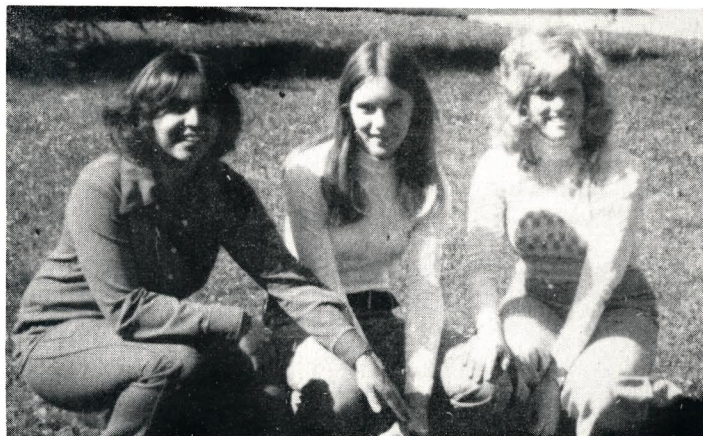

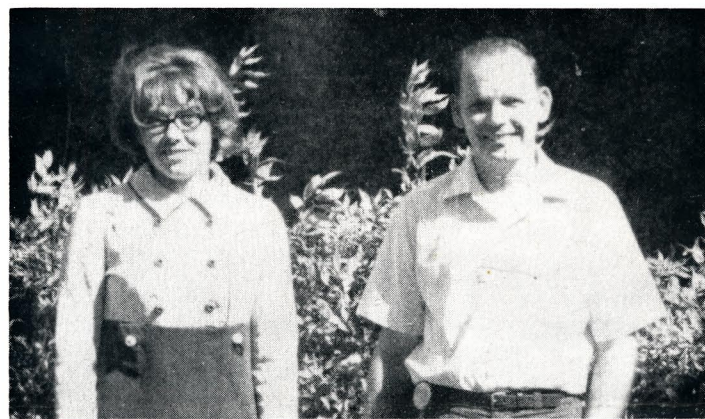

Now let's see, what were the results of the 1972 Olympics?

Seventeen persons were killed in a Munich version of the Arab-Israeli war.

Two of America's fastest runners were disqualified because they arrived late for a trial heat.

An American swimmer, 16, lost his gold medal because he took a forbidden drug for his asthma - a drug he had reported he was taking before the Olympics began.

Jim Ryun, who had worked like a professional for four years, fell down and wan't given another chance.

The Cuban boxers did so well they were accused of being professionals. The Russian weightlifters did so poorly they were accused of being amateurs.

Some of the judges of both boxing and diving appeared to be out to lunch most of the time. When they were there, they judged politics more than performance.

Two black Americans didn't stand at attention when the American National Anthem was played. The crowd became angry and they were disbarred from any other competition.

And, finally, the Russians were awarded the gold medal in basketball in a fiasco of extra time. That caused as much bad feeling as it would had they given the Russians the medal before the game started.

There we have it: The Olympics, the spirit of international brotherhood and integrity, the event designed to be pure and above politics. It's not who wins but how you play the game, goes the cliché. Well, tell that to the American basketball team, and to Ryun and the boxers and divers who got cheated and to the kid with the asthma. And tell it to the two black Americans who didn't show top respect to a country with a long history

of not showing blacks much of any respect.

And, most of all, tell it to the dead Israeli athletes who had a right to feel safe in Munich. One thing was very apparent: The hypocrisy of the Olympics. The strict little technicalities on one hand and the crooked judging on the other. The cloak of amateurism and the fact that many of the athletes are subsidized one way or another including the Americans. In a real way the Olympics mirror what's going on in the world today: War, discrimination, dishonesty at both private and government levels. And you name it.

It's obvious the Olympics need a minor overhaul. As does the world. I can hardly wait for the 1976 Olympics ...
