Armistice Day Observed

Nov. 11, 1918, the armistice agreement ending World War I was signed. The day is widely celebrated as Armistice Day.

Armistice is a temporary suspension of hostilities between two belligerent powers or two armies by mutual agreement, to bury the dead, remove the wounded, exchange prisoners, and sometimes to allow a conference between the opposing generals.

A general armistice is usually the starting of peace, such as the one that we celebrate.

At 11:00 Nov. 11, everyone was supposed to stop work or play and stay silent for one minute.

Since 1954, Nov. 11 has been known as Veterans Day in the United States.

All men and women who have served in the United States armed forces are honored on this day.
