### Drug Speaker In Contemporary Problems

The 7th and 9th hour Contemporary Problems classes were fortunate to hear drug speakers from the Indianhead Drug Abuse Council at Amery on Monday and Thursday, January 6 and 9.

Indianhead has an eight member staff and three of these came to talk to us. One was a young man who told us his story about the seven year bad trip he had before receiving treatment. Another was the wife of an alcoholic. She gave us examples and differences of sociable, prescription, and illicit drugs. Another man, who mainly observed, is setting up a program in another part of the state.

Their job is to travel from school to school in Polk County talking to classes and setting up drug education courses. A main purpose is helping addicts!

People have 2 definite fears when debating treatment, they're afraid of the cure-environment bars and padded cell walls - and what the treatment will be like. The second is fear of being turned over to the authorities and having a thorough interrogation. Both of these are false!

I've been trying to figure out where I failed, where I went wrong. After some deep reflection, I think I have found the answer.
