The program consisted of storytelling, traditional dances of the island and the amazing fingerwork of Jean-Mac.

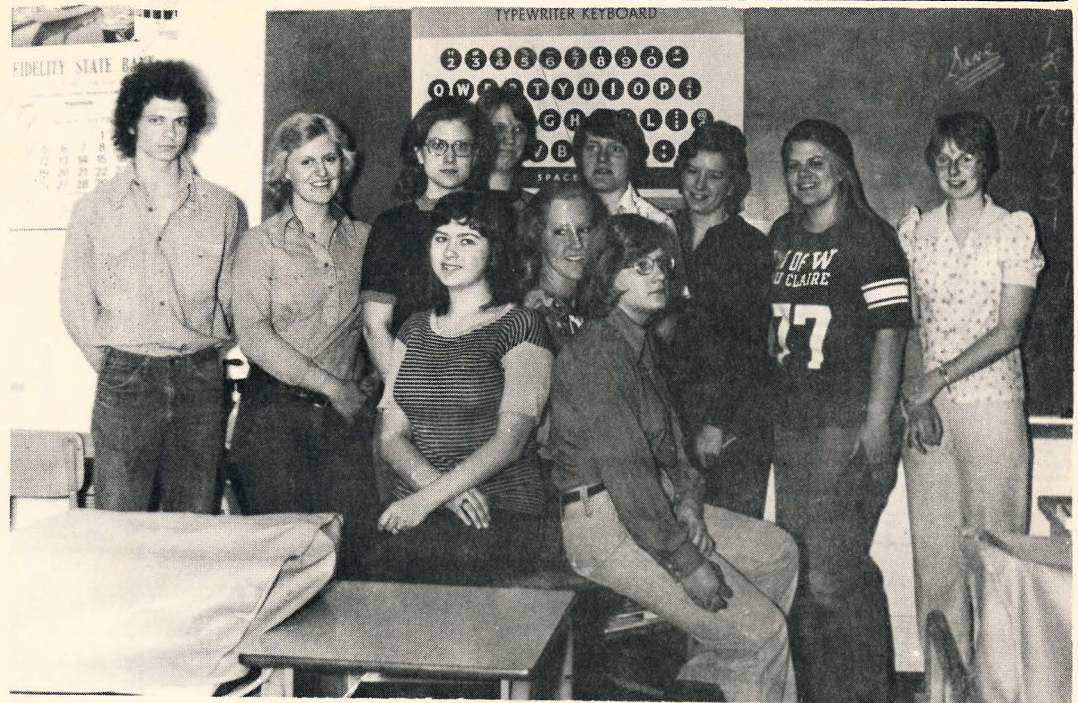



The girls are very strong in shot and discus, high jump, sprints, and relays, so there are good chances of some events going far. The Luck girls won 57 to 48.

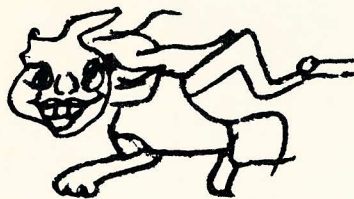
